



Shock loss has Crows in a flap

THE Slowdown futures of Adelaide coach **Graham Cornes** and aggro midfielder **Andrew Jarman** hang in the balance following the Crows' shock six-point loss to the Power last night.

The Power kicked the final four goals of the game to snatch a late win – prompting commentator **Ken “KG” Cunningham** and event organiser **Chris McDermott** to call for Cornes' head.

“That’s it for Cornsey – he’s gone,” McDermott said.

Jarman, meantime, will come under review for a final term “attack” on guest umpire **Ben Hook**, according to the *Sunday Mail* columnist.

“I paid a free kick against him and he didn’t like it so he threw the footy at me,” Hook said.

“I’d suggest his immediate Slowdown future is in serious doubt – he’ll be up for trial by video.”

A contentious late free from fellow whistleblower **Mick Abbott** allowed **Stuart Dew** to tie the scores with a long bomb before **Gavin Wanganeen** snapped through the match-winner.

But despite the Crows' loss, Hook said crowd favourite **Tony Modra** received three votes for his seven-goal performance.

“I’d have to give the three votes to Mods for kicking seven goals. None of the Port Adelaide players wanted to man him up.”

Hook said he enjoyed having the “ultimate power” of ordering around past SA champions like **Shaun Rehn**, **Rodney Maynard** and **Josh Francou**.

“I felt like a big, fat version of **Ray Chamberlain**. I did enjoy the power – that’s what it’s all about.”

McDermott thanked the big crowd that gathered to watch Port’s 17.13 (115) to 17.7 (109) victory at Adelaide Oval which raised funds for the Little Heroes Foundation.
